




The T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood® COLORADO Scholarship Program is a national, evidence-based strategy that creates access to higher education for teachers, directors, and family child care providers through comprehensive scholarships that enable early educators to take coursework leading to credentials and degrees. Early childhood professionals who have a higher education have been shown to have a better understanding of child development and to be more responsive to the educational and academic needs of young children. Since 1998, the program has served 2,416 scholarship recipients.

Across the state, there are only enough licensed child care services for 45 percent of the 256,000 kids birth to age six with working parents. There is a substantial increase in the need for early childhood teachers and leaders – between 33-43% (depending on job category) through 2025. T.E.A.C.H. is a strategy that helps to support increased capacity and quality for young children while increasing education and wages for professionals.

The program currently offers scholarships to eligible professionals to obtain their licensing credential, associate, or bachelor's degree. The benefits include 90% of tuition, fees, and textbooks; travel stipend; bonus upon successful completion of coursework; paid release time to attend classes; and additional bonus or raise after completion of the work commitment.



Scholarships were awarded to recipients in Adams, Arapahoe, Boulder, Denver, Douglas, Elbert, El Paso, Grand, Gunnison, Jefferson, Larimer, Morgan, Pitkin, Pueblo, and Weld counties.




