
Back to Work: Early Childhood Education Scholarship Program

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Across the state, there are only enough licensed child care services for 45 percent of the 256.000 kids birth to working age six with parents. There is а substantial increase in the need for early childhood teachers and leaders between 33-43% (depending on iob category) through 2025. Back to Work is a helps strategy that to support increased capacity quality for and voung children while increasing education for professionals.

Back to Work supports recruitment and retention through \$3,500 scholarships to help professionals advance in their education and careers. ECCLA's Back to Work: Early Childhood Education Scholarship is a unique program that supports early childhood professionals who experienced an economic loss due to the COVID-19 pandemic and want to earn undergraduate-level degrees and certificates related to Early Childhood Education. Through the <u>Back to Work Grant</u>, ECCLA is proud to partner with the <u>Colorado Department of Higher Education</u>'s COSI Scholarship Program to help provide the education and training you need for your next job in the Early Childhood profession! The <u>Colorado Recovery Plan</u> expands the <u>Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative (COSI)</u> grant to support Coloradans that have experienced an economic loss due to the COVID-19 pandemic or suffered another form of economic loss.

VOICES FROM THE PROFESSION

Participants are at the heart of the Back to Work: Early Childhood Education Scholarship Program. **And their stories matter.**

Meet. Martina

My name is Martina and I am a recipient of ECCLA's Back to Work Scholarship. I was born and raised right here in Denver where I serve families and children. I am a mother of 5 really cool children and am on track to be the first in my family to graduate from college. I am a full time student at Red Rocks Community College, and Director and owner of Colorado Adventure Kids. I have been in the Early Childhood Education profession for over 12 years, I was just shy of 18 when I first stepped into a classroom.

Although I am a small business owner, things aren't always successful or promising. After and during COVID-19, my family and I have faced homelessness twice just within the last two years. I wear many hats and often have placed my educational goals on the back burner to concentrate on other things. Sadly, I know a lot of early childhood educators that live in poverty and experience similar things my children and I have. Within all of the economic issues surrounding the educators in my profession, one thing about myself and individuals teaching is this: Early Childhood Educators serve our communities with the most important job. Teaching, caring for and loving young children is crucial in society. Especially in today's surroundings. There are a million things going on in the world, but one thing never changes. And that is the importance of teachers in our communities. And the teachers be highly educated themselves.
